KING EDDIES DAY

This year in July, King Edward Memorial Hospital (KEMH) celebrated 106 years of caring for women and babies in Western Australia.

The hospital opened its doors in 1916 following campaigning by prominent Western Australian women including Edith Cowan.

The original hospital was housed in 'Harvey House' which is now home to the WA Medical Museum.

In 2022, almost 6000 babies will be born at the hospital and KEMH is one part of a broader Women and Newborn Health Service and includes Osborne Park Hospital, hospital water births, a Family Birth Centre, Community Midwifery and an outstanding Visiting Midwifery Service that enables women to return home soon after giving birth.

KEMH also has world class pastoral services which care for women who suffer devastating pregnancy loss, and our gynaecology teams are a safe place for women with ongoing and complex gynaecology concerns.

One hundred and six years ago staff at KEMH began providing care to women and today, KEMH continues to be a trusted leader in women's health care.



JEN SMYTH RETIRES
