2020 wasn't just a busy year for the Emergency Centre and COVID-19 clinics, it was also the busiest year in 104 years at King Edward Memorial Hospital! There were 6431 babies born that year, with 200 sets of twins, 4 sets of triplets and even 1 set of quadruplets (pictured).
